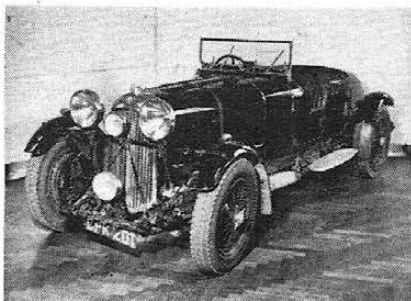

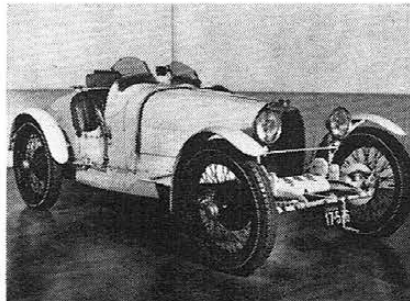

—Porsche —Mercedes 300 SL



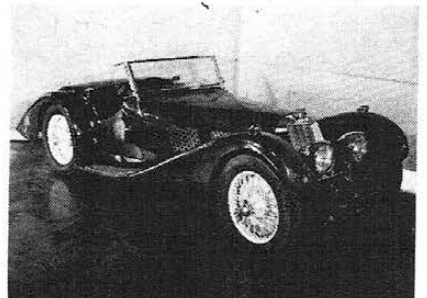
(4) Special bodied Italo-Anglo-American car finished eleventh in 1953 Le Mans Race.

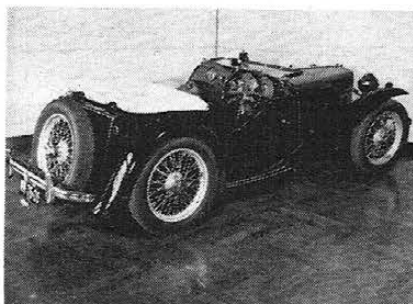
(5) This Italian sports is no longer made by the brothers after whom it is named.

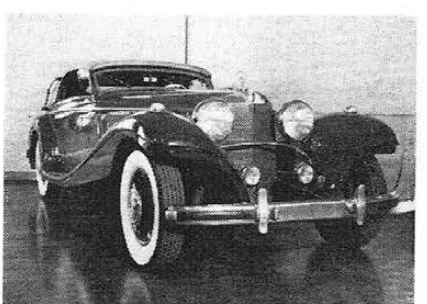
(7) It's an MG but the wire wheels and boxy design show it's of a certain series. Which?
