

EAST-WEST CHAMPIONSHIPS

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OW DO YOU describe an all $oldsymbol{\Pi}$ star funny car meet that has a little bit of everything? If you were one of the 20,000 spectators that viewed the two days of action, you might describe it as wheelstands, wheelstands, and more wheelstands. On the other hand, if you were a competitor, you might tab the meet as "upset city," or "I broke every-thing but my seatbelt trying to win." Whatever the case may be, Drag Racing Magazine East-West Stocker Championship was the name of the game.

All the big guns were present; "Dyno" Don Nicholson, Mr. Norm, Sox and Martin, Arnie Beswick, Gas Ronda, Dick Landy, Don Gay, Hayden Proffitt, and Hubert Platt were among the 50 top rate contenders.

The two day program called for 14 best two-out-of-three match races among the best injected cars from the East and the West on Saturday, parlayed into heads-up competition for the big bucks on Sunday.

The match race war Saturday found the East in control.

The one race everyone was waiting for between the number one cars from the East and West, Don Nicholson and Dick Landy, never materialized. Landy had the misfortune of scattering an engine during the afternoon warm-up session, so a replacement had to be found to race the Comet of Nicholson.


An all-out battle for funny car supremacy pitted the best from the West against the cream of the East. When the smoke cleared it still wasn't a clear cut victory for either faction!

Jim Liberman volunteered his fast rising blown Chevy II as competition for the "Eliminator I," and gave Nicholson a nose to nose battle. But the Mercury proved too much to overcome, grabbing the match two straight with times of 8.69-163.93 and 8.44-167.91. Liberman ran 8.99-162.16 on a 300 foot "wheelie" run, and 8.65-165.44. Not too bad for a G.M. product!

Gas Ronda's Mustang and the Sox and Martin Barracuda appeared to be one of the closest matches of the bunch. Ronnie Sox took the first race when Ronda's mount ran into mechanical difficulties, 9.25-165.74 to 9.47-133.92. Ronda discovered after the race that his fuel tank had broken loose and was not allowing the full amount of "go juice" into the engine. The Ply-


mouth was a two straight winner with a strong 8.92-166.97 to the Ford's 9.07-156.52. The two cars came back for a third race and Ronda had the satisfaction of taking this one at 8.93-157.61.

The West had one big hope in Hayden Proffitt and his hard charging Corvair for a decisive match race win. And the "Old Master" didn't let the highly partisan West Coast crowd down. Hayden's victim was Roger Lindamood's "Color Me Gone" Dodge charger, and it was a two straight affair.

Lindamood red lighted himself into a loss in the first round as the Corvair marched by for the win at 8.90-157.61. Proffitt did a masterful job on the starting line in the second round and was simply not catchable. Times were: Proffitt -8.68-158.17,

Lindamood - 9.43-162.16.

Other interesting results included: Steffy and Schartman over Tom Grove two straight; Steffey-8.60-172.14, 8.62-168.53. Kelly Chadwick took two from Pee Wee Wallace; Kelly-9.64-145.39 and 9.62-146.57. Hubert Platt wheeled his Mustang to a two straight win against Lew Arrington's "Brutus," who replaced Gene Snow's Dart; Platt - 8.69-163.33 and 9.33-161.00. Pete Seaton's Corvair strapped it on Cecil Yother's "Missile" two straight; Seaton-9.46-149.75, 9.40-152.08; Yother -10.14-144.23 and 9.17-146.10. Doug Thorley grabbed one for the West in his "Chevy Too Much" in three rounds over Doug Nash's "Bronco Buster." Thorley -9.95-144.00, 10.13-140.62, and 9.91-144.46; Nash-9.69-138,24, 10.41-137.82, and 9.92-139.90.





Four matches between Richard Schroeder and Jim Wetton, Dick Harrell and Bill Rieck, Charlie Allen and Houston Platt, and Shirley Shahan and Clester Andrews ended in dead heats as the curfew stopped the running of their third rounds.

On Sunday, three separate classes were open to all the cars that had run Saturday, plus the supercharged cars.

The first class was for blown funny cars and was worth \$1,000 plus contingency awards. The other two classes were for injected cars weighing either under 2400 lbs. or 2500 lbs. and over.

The West was in command on Sunday, as they grabbed all three eliminator brackets for a clean sweep.

In the blown class, upset was the



But bad luck struck all three cars during eliminations as Mr. Norm's car had ignition problems, the "Kingfish" lost a rearend on a burn through and Gay lost out to a hole shot.

The big winners were Roger Wolford and Ed Lenarth in their "Secret Weapon" Jeep, powered by a blown 392" Chrysler. Wolford did a super job of driving the 180 m.p.h. Jeep and took advantage of his knowledge of the starting system for the winning combination. The "Jeep" ran 8.80-176.12 for a second round win over Gay, 8.79-162.45. In the third round, Wolford's 8.74-176.81 was too much for Ron Rayons blown "Vette."

The light weight injected class had a similar situation brewing, as the big MoPar and Ford Factory

cars appeared to be the cars to beat.

Hubert Platt's Mustang cut an 8.68-164.83 to grab the first round over his brother, Houston Platt, who ran a 9.20-149.75.

Meanwhile, Ronnie Sox was looking good in his Barracuda and Ford's West Coast hope, Gas Ronda, cut a fat 8.65-163.04 to win the first round over Doug Thorley's Chevy II.

Hayden Proffitt kept getting quicker and quicker with the "World's Fastest Chevy" as he dropped Charlie Allen's Dart in the first round; Proffitt - 8.63-158.17, Allen - 8.85-159.85.

The apple cart really got upset in round two when Sox hole-shotted Platt for the win; 8.67-166.66 to 8.61-162.74. Ronda ran 8.72-159.85 to win over a wheelie plagued Dick Landy and Proffitt made an all-out single run that netted a fantastic 8.49-161.57! It looked as though Chevrolet was in command!

Proffitt ended MoPar hopes with an 8.52-159.85 win over Sox and Martin, who shut off with engine problems. Ronda singled in his Mustang to stay qualified for the final round.

The crowd was really buzzing when the two rivals pulled to the line for the final run which was

worth \$1,000 to the winner. Ford lovers were shot down when Ronda lost a couple of bearings trying to light the SOHC Ford and was unable to fire, but the Chevy fans couldn't have been happier!

Proffitt was the winner and delighted the cheering crowd with a gigantic wheelie on the single. What a performer!

Roger Lindamood's "Color Me

Gone" Charger appeared to be a sure winner in the heavy class as he consistently ran under nine seconds making his way into the final round.


But Cecil Yother in his famed "Melrose Missile" had "upset" in mind and wasn't going to be caught in the run for the money. Yother was the winner at 9.49-149.75 when Lindamood got completely crossed-

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up and had to shut off.

Lindamood ran 8.81-163.16 and 8.95-163.63 on his way to the final run, while Yother ran 9.63-153.06, 9.39-152.54, and 9.24-152.28. Kelly Chadwick had his Chevy II running hard, as he made it to the semi-final round where the "Missile" put him away.

Other highlights of the meet included the "wheelie" trio of Bill single that amazed the "Maverick" Golden, "Wild" Bill competitors alike. The Shrewsberry, and Chuck Poole. This sler powered sports of "fearsome threesome" had the m.p.h. in 8.20 seconds!

crowd on their feet with their daredevil antics on two wheels. Poole ran off with the longest wheelstand of the meet, while Shrewsberry won the highest and wildest.

"Dyno" Don Nicholson won low elapsed time of the meet honors for legal funny cars at 8.35. The A.M.T. Piranha, driven by ace pilot Connie Swingle, made an exhibition single that amazed the crowd and competitors alike. The blown Chrysler powered sports car hit 196.40 m.p.h. in 8.20 seconds!
